	Rapid testing programme: Staff will be offered 2 lateral flow tests per week, for use at home. We will ask them to carefully read the government's guidance on self- administering tests, alongside the instructions in their test kit, to make sure				
	they know how to safely do this. We won't need to see evidence of a negative test result in order to allow staff to attend school.				
	 Any staff members receiving a positive lateral flow test result will be told: To remain at home, take a standard coronavirus (PCR) test and let us know the result (if a home testing kit is available in school, this can be given to them, if they have barriers to accessing testing elsewhere) 				
	 That they, and members of their household, should self-isolate in line with the latest government guidance 				
	• That they should report their lateral flow test result, either via the <u>test</u> reporting website or by calling 119				
	As soon as we hear that a staff member has tested positive with a lateral flow test, we will follow the same cleaning measures (laid out above) as if that staff				





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	member had been symptomatic while in school. All staff and pupils will continue to follow the measures set out in this risk assessment, even if we're participating in rapid testing. We will keep accurate records of all test results, and only share health records with the relevant people. If the school becomes aware that a pupil or a staff member has tested positive for coronavirus and needs advice on next steps, the school will contact the DfE helpline on 0800 046 8687 and select option 1. (If no advice is required, the school will report the case using the DfE's <u>'online attendance form daily</u> return'). The advice service (or local health protection team, if the call is escalated to them), will carry out a rapid risk assessment to confirm who's been in close contact with the person when infectious. The school will ask (using a template letter from the local health protection team) all close contacts to self-isolate in line with current government guidance. If there are 2 or more confirmed cases within 14 days, or an overall rise in sickness absence where coronavirus is suspected, the school will work with the local health protection team, who can be				



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	 reached by calling the DfE helpline and selecting option 1, to decide if additional action is needed. Any advice given by the team will be followed. 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Contact with coronavirus when getting to and from school	 Everyone will be encouraged to walk, cycle or scoot into school, and asked to avoid taking public transport during peak times if possible. Anyone who needs to take public transport will be referred to government guidance. 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Spreading infection through contact with coronavirus on surfaces	Cleaning staff will regularly clean frequently touched surfaces using standard cleaning products (e.g. bleach, detergent), including: • Banisters • Classroom desks and tables • Bathroom facilities (including taps and flush buttons) • Door and window handles • Furniture • Light switches • Reception desks • Teaching and learning aids • Computer equipment (including keyboards and mouse) • Telephones • Fingerprint scanners • Outdoor play equipment Items that need laundering (e.g. towels, flannels, bedding) will be washed regularly in accordance with the manufacturer's instructions, on the warmest water setting. These items will not be shared between children between washes. 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	the previous two bubbles will continue not to mix indoors, share indoor spaces and/or equipment. Mixing will only occur outdoors at playtime and outdoors during the whole school meeting once a week. The large number of pupils in classrooms means that social distancing is not possible, however pupils will be reminded about avoiding touch where possible. We will follow the government's <u>guidance</u> for lessons involving drama, singing, chanting, shouting or playing instruments (particularly wind or brass instruments). These will take place outside wherever possible. If taking place inside, larger, well-ventilated rooms will be used and the number of people will be limited to allow for social distancing. Singing will take place outside where possible with pupils seated side-by-side. We will not host performances with an audience until the government have announced it is legal to do so. For physical activity, we will follow the same guidance for cleaning equipment and grouping pupils as in all areas of the school. 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	 where possible. Due to lack of space, indoor sports will not be permitted. For team sports, we will follow the government guidance on team sport. Staff can work across different groups in order to deliver the school timetable, but they will keep their distance from pupils and other staff as much as they can (ideally 2 metres apart). This won't always be possible, particularly when working with younger children, but close face-to-face contact will be avoided, and time spent within 1 metre will be minimised. Any pupils with complex needs or who need close contact care will have the 				
	same support as normal as distancing isn't possible here. Staff will be rigorous about hand washing and respiratory hygiene. Supply teachers, peripatetic teachers and other temporary staff and volunteers will be told to minimise contact and maintain as much distance as possible from other staff. These staff will also participate in the school's rapid testing programme, as outlined for other staff/pupils above. Specialists, therapists, clinicians and other support staff for pupils with SEND should provide interventions as usual.

Spreading infection due to excessive contact and mixing between pupils and staff around and outside of the school	Pupils will be kept in the same groups at separate from other groups at all times apart from playtime, or essential play rehearsals closer to the end of term. Staff will be asked to wear face coverings in areas of the school where social distancing with other adults isn't possible, such as corridors and communal areas, unless they're exempt from wearing one. They'll be given clear instructions about how to put on, remove and store/dispose of face coverings safely. Visitors will be asked to wear face masks at all times when on the school site. Pupils who routinely attend other settings on a part-time basis, such as an alternative provision setting, should be able to continue attending both settings. The school will work with these other settings to work out a system to keep these pupils safe. Movement around the school site will be kept to a minimum to avoid creating busy corridors.
